METHODOLOGY

On behalf of the Varkey Foundation, Ipsos MORI interviewed **27,380** parents across **29 countries** using an **online survey** via the Ipsos Online Panel system* between the 8th December 2017 and 15th January 2018. These countries were:



- 371 parents took part in **Uganda**. Results contain 1,000 interviews from all other countries except Kenya (501) and Estonia (500).
- The survey was conducted online. For countries where internet penetration is low (such as India, **Uganda**, Kenya, Estonia and Indonesia), it is important to note that the data is representative of the urban online population, which tends to be better educated and financially better off.
- Data has been weighted by age, gender and region of child and corrected for gender of parent.
- As such, the survey is representative of parents of children aged 4-18 in education, based on these characteristics, with equal views from mothers and fathers.
- All countries contribute equally to the total global average. Data has not been adjusted for the relative size of population.








If there were additional funds for their child's school, **over half** (**56%**) of Ugandan parents would like to see them spent on better pay for teachers, considerably higher than any other country surveyed.

Ugandan parents are the least concerned of any country surveyed about their children's happiness at school with only **20%** citing this as among the three things that cause them the most anxiety about their child at school.

Twenty-nine percent of Ugandan parents report they did not get their first choice of school for their child, more than any other country surveyed apart from Singapore (31%).

Cost is the most significant factor for Ugandan parents when picking their children's schools, with **29%** citing it as among their top three concerns – higher than any other country surveyed.

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
If there were additional funds for your child's school, which of the following would you like to see it spent on?


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Top 7 categories most often chosen as 1st,2nd or 3rd choice globally

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What, if any of the following, causes you the most anxiety about your child at school?




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Which of the following statements best describes your experience of choosing your child's current school?


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
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
Which of the following, if any, were the most important factors when choosing your child's current school?


How would you rate the quality of free to attend government-funded


schools in your country?

Almost two-thirds (66%) of Ugandan parents rate free to attend schools in their country as poor or very poor – more than in any other country surveyed.

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To what extent do you approve or disapprove of the following organisations running free to attend schools?

Private companies

Almost two-thirds (65%) of Ugandan parents are happy for private companies to run free to attend schools – higher than the global average of 46%, but lower than the other African countries surveyed. In Kenya it is 72% and in South Africa it is 67%.

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
